

Shed – new donated Safety/CERT 6 shed needs caulking of cedar planks on outside and staining. Team members will check their own supplies for caulk and stain, then we'll go from there. If we cover the window with plywood and trim, it will be dark – no electricity – so we could use a lantern (batteries could be rechargeable). Fundraising for the 500\$ moving fee - Mary H will send out a reminder email to park about donations. At the Mem day potluck, we will also do a 50:50 specifically for this fundraising effort. Mary H will create a list and/or display, of items we still need to purchase (see below).

Finances: \$1190 at beginning of Spring – 500 for shed moving = \$690

Already purchased over Winter for CERT 6 (and not yet reimbursed) were laminated area maps, 3 soft litters (\$12 ea), wire stakes with orange flags, and bungee cords for a total of \$128.81. The Team voted to approve those expenditures for reimbursement.

Proposed expenditures are: more dispo gloves, carabiners, dust masks, Quick Clotting bandages, and a roll of Elkay Visqueen which can be used to create a large clean surface, for medical, for example. The total cost would be approximately \$200. The Team voted to approve those purchases.

A discussion of how the Joyce CERT Team has constructed a water purification system sufficiently sized to provide clean water for about 300 people, versus how we might approach our situation here with approximately 50 homes outside of DBR (which are the responsibility of CERT 6), led the Team to lean toward Basic water purification items (w/ cost):

Clorox (5), cheesecloth 25 yards (45), alum 5 lbs (20), 50 gal drums (3x40\$ or 6x40), large funnels (10) which total 200 or 320.

This would allow for – alum causing sedimentation of suspended particulates, cleaning up by filtering through cheesecloth, treating with chlorine and allowing 24 hour rest time before drinking to allow chlorine to degrade. This water could be used to fill personal water filters and/or run through the existing water filters we have – the Lifestraw Family filters – for final purification.

Joyce CERT system would require at minimum, a large volume reservoir (275 gal, for 175-275\$), a bilge pump (129), filter housing unit (145), and 3 sets of filters (159). With three 55 gal drums for purified water and a few miscellany, that would total about \$685-785, without a trailer on which to carry it all.

Emergency prep in general – how to get neighbors to prepare for themselves. We discussed going door to door with a flyer, introducing ourselves to anyone who answers the door. And discussed having an outside speaker (Fire Dept or CERT person) to discuss how each of us must prepare for ourselves.

Safety Team as various emergency Teams: power outage team, propane shutoff Team, water shutoff team – discussed how each street can have multiple people who will volunteer to fill roles. We'd like a refresher class from Barb G on how to handle well and septic in a power outage. Mary H will ask BG.

Also – Michele R will ask a propane guy about strapping our propane tanks down – both community tanks and individual lot tanks.

Discussed a wood stove, and how we need one that after the QUAKE we can install it in whatever building remains viable for shelter – watch Craigslist for a cheap one. Need the pipes to vent it also.

Other issues in park we need to address? Raised:

1) laundry room light switch – change to a motion sensor? Mary will talk to Barb G.

2) People coming on 101 from West back to park and crossing all lanes to scoot along on North side shoulder – where a leaseholder coming out from park has nearly been hit 2x, by 2 different park people. THIS IS DANGEROUS! Someone exiting the park has no way to see the person coming from the right. PLEASE RECONSIDER THIS TACTIC – You might be frightened sitting out in the turn lane waiting for your opportunity to turn in, but this is our situation. If it frightens you that much, please consider driving down Old Gardiner past the park and coming at the park from the East on 101.

3) People coming out of the park should beware: At times, vehicles large and small decide to pull off at the historical sign – to rest, or eat lunch, or read the sign. If you pull out from our gate past the dirt onto the asphalt, you are in their path. It might be a semi – it might be a Mini-Cooper – either way, their speed will give them the advantage, and there you are in the drivers side at the point of impact. It is safer to pull to the dirt and wait so that you are not in anyone's path.

Team Leader selection was on the agenda, still we overlooked it. As soon as we are able to sort it out, we will notify the BOD as to who was chosen.
