

Notes by Mary Harrison

Attendees: Mary Harrison, Jeri Neiberding, Joann Gardner, Barb Gilger, and Linda Enger, with liaison Mary Wynn.

Pet care form update: Joann had created a draft, and Jeri had revised the draft, providing space for up to 3 pets to be described. We added that the pet owner name any people who have a key to their home. That person may not be the same as the person named to care for the pet(s). I will try to get the form down to a half sheet with front and back info. Pet owners will be encouraged to do the following:

- Give the office a key and a copy of their pet care form
- Give multiple people a key
- Name more than one person for pet care, and give each one a copy of their pet care form

– all of that, in case any person they name is gone from the park when the emergency arises. Pet owners will be also be encouraged put one copy of the pet care form on their refrigerator or other conspicuous place.

Emergency notification update: The megaphone test performed by Kosha/CERT on Sunday was disappointing; the megaphone was not heard much of anywhere in the park. Barb G brought a megaphone out of her office and we tested it briefly – it seemed rather LOUD. Linda will give it to Kosha and they will figure out whether it is effective/whether both megaphones could be used/where they should be kept/who would have access to use them in an emergency.

Berm fire hazard evaluation: Blaine Zechenelly with the Clallam County Fire District 3 came out and affirmed that the grass growing on our berms is a fire hazard. The recommended distance from vegetation like that to a residence is 30 feet, so we need to take action. Barb said she and Dave will start weedwhacking immediately and get things under control. She's recently been getting a few bites from people interested in the job, so she wants it manageable when they show up to tackle the usual mowing/weedeating job.

Items for medical packs: Sometime last year the large CERT medical pack given to us by the fire dept got wet in the cache in which it was stored and the items inside were ruined. I replaced the items, but also ordered in significantly larger quantities because CERT had made plans to create small packs to be taken inside our tiny homes, since we have to leave our regular packs outside in order to FIT inside the tiny houses. The total was \$129.75. There'll be enough to also supply 2 small Stop the Bleed packs that can be kept with the two AEDs in the park (in Radclyffe and in the lower women's restroom). The group approved the purchases for reimbursement. They also recommended that we purchase tourniquets to be kept in each of the small packs. I will research that and we can discuss it again at the next meeting.

Update on purchase of a small wood stove: The Team had reviewed the links I sent and approved of the idea of a post-earthquake wood burning stove installation in the office. The stove comes with 10 feet of chimney sections, but we'll need 2 elbows and a few other items to make it work efficiently and safely. I will research Barb's idea of using Durock ½" cement board, to be placed under and behind the stove, in addition to a fire resistant rug and a metal pan to catch embers. The stove kit will be stored in the CERT shed. Purchase of the wood stove was approved; the cost is \$187 plus tax.

Firewood: Barb reported that we'll soon have more firewood – they'll be dealing with downed trees out on the nature trail, and some trees up by the storage sheds east of the main parking lot which are not safe. She'll check how much of our original firewood has been used. The new firewood will be stacked separately but in the same area (off the North end of the nature trail).

Update on door closers: Barb reported that the closers have been purchased but it might take a bit before she and Dave can install them.

Next meeting – because I can't make the next meeting on June 25th, the team decided to push it one week out to July 2nd. Same place, same time: in the Office, at 6 PM. Every resident is ALWAYS invited to sit in.
